Conflict make your palms sweaty? Here's help

We've all known the feelings of panic: heartbeat speeds up, breathing changes, words don't come out right, eyes don't know where to look. Anger is growing. A confrontation has dropped in and the feelings aren't pleasant.

Some of us were fortunate to learn how to get a grip, master the emotions and handle the situation effectively. Others were not so lucky and, even as grownups, struggle with these episodes in daily interactions.

Well, help is on the way. Plan to attend the Friends of Main Library's Feb. 21 program at 2 p.m. and learn ways to increase your confidence and learn "Conflict is inevitable in our lives. Yet most of us have never learned how to deal with it effectively. We try to avoid conflict, but it doesn't go away. We get angry and lash out at others, which only makes things worse.

"Yet, there's hope. New research into conflict has discovered ways that people can respond more effectively and get better outcomes from disagreements. Find out how you can address conflicts at home and work, and in the community."

John Romano was born and raised in St. Petersburg. He graduated from the University of South Florida in Tampa, joined the *St. Petersburg Times* as a sports writer in 1985 and has covered the UF Gators, the Orlando Magic, the Tampa Bay Buccaneers and Rays.

He has been a columnist since 2002, and was honored as one of America's two best sports columnists in 2003. Further national and statewide awards have been earned, and his writing on local and area issues is widely admired. His column appears on Sundays, Tuesdays and Thursdays.

His Metro column debuted just as the newspaper's name became the *Tampa Bay Times*.

He is a frequent speaker and commentator on workplace conflict issues, and on the editorial board of the *Journal of Conflict Management*. Before joining Eckerd College, he was the director of the International Center for Computer Enhanced Learning at Wake Forest University.

Runde received his B.A. from Harvard University, M.L.L. from the University of Denver, and J.D. from Duke University. He has practiced law in Colorado and has taught at the University of Minnesota Law School and at Wake Forest University.

He also directs the Mediation Training Institute International at Eckerd.
